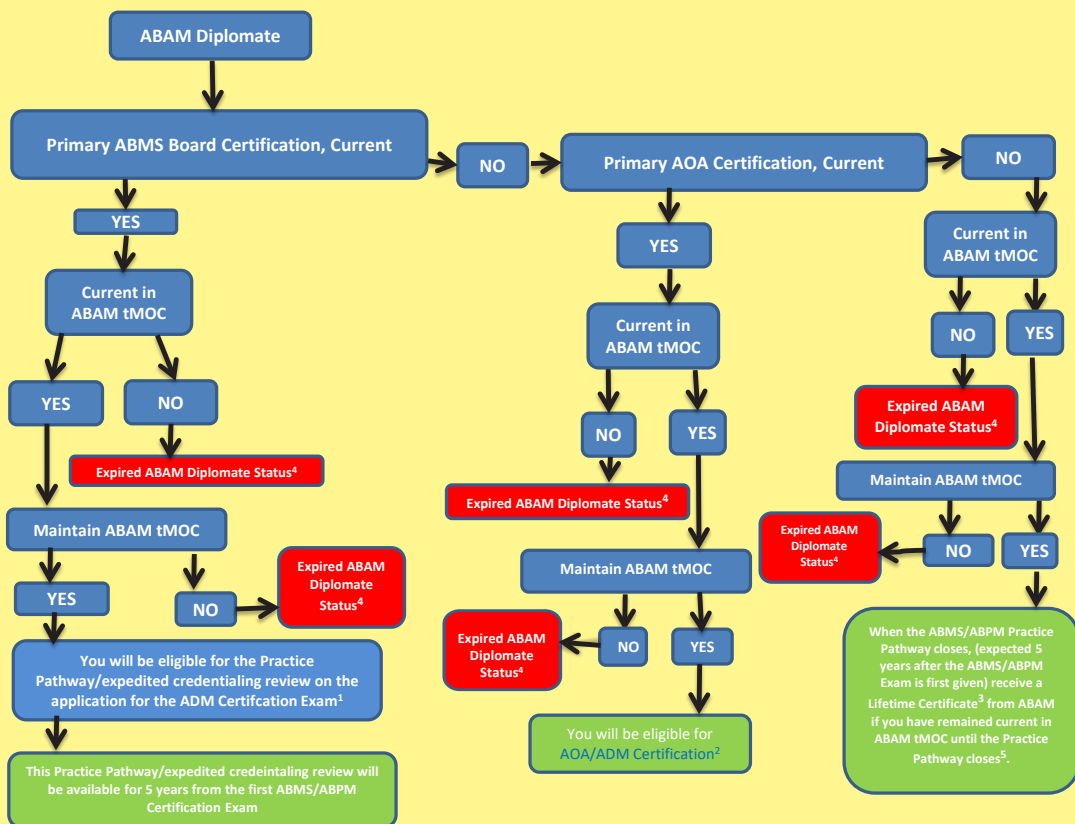

3: When the Practice Pathway ends, these diplomates will receive a Lifetime ABAM certificate. No credentialing, verification or MOC services will be offered. A static listing with dates of original and recertification certificates will be available on an ABAM website.

4: Diplomates who have not remained current in ABAM Tmoc have an expired certificate. Re-instatement is available: the current year Annual Fee is required, as well as a \$250 reinstatement fee. The past year's MOC requirements must also be met.

5: If you were 65 years of age or older on July 1, 2016, and are eligible for ABPM/ABMS ADM certification yet do not seek it, you will receive a Lifetime Certificate when the Practice pathway ends. You must remain current in tMOC during the Practice pathway period.
